THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Greetings all! I must admit that it is nice to return to Garden Club activities after a wonderful holiday. I hope you all are feeling the same rejuvenation and rightful anticipation for what lies ahead for all of us through May. Please read this newsletter cover to cover. It contains much information not to be missed! And don't miss this week's meeting. Come hear Margot Shaw, editor of Flower Magazine, and our two GCA Zone VII heads on Wednesday, January 15, at Lewis Ginter Botanical Garden Auditorium. Program begins at 10:00am and there will be a book sale and signing after the meeting. We've worked so hard on this meeting. Come support our efforts! If you can't be there, don't forget to give your excused absence to Ellen Buoyer. Remember, 3 excused absences per year.

I really want to share with you these snippets which Brent and Becky, of Brent and Becky's Bulbs in Gloucester, recently shared on the internet. I give full credit to them for this great information which I summarize and embellish a little below.

New Year's Resolutions for Gardeners:

- 1. <u>Give your tools some TLC</u>. I am guilty of this. I store my tools with grit and grim on them and that is not proper etiquette for our tools! Declutter your shed and clear out supplies and tools no longer of use to you. Clean your tools. Sharpen your blades.
- 2. Plant out of your comfort zone. Isn't this a novel idea! This year instead of previously planting what you planted in your beds, garden and containers last year, try something different. Experiment and discover new plants you've never grown before. Try a new bulb or a new vegetable. You can buy these at our plant sale in April!
- 3. <u>Visit a community garden</u>. Gather your inspiration from any of the wonderful community gardens we have in Richmond and beyond. Take a child or grandchild for some extra excitement or an elderly friend for some fresh air and sunshine.
- 4. Really commit to a garden journal. How many times have I started a journal in the spring only to fall short of the effort by fall? This year I resolve to do this completely!
- 5. TRY NATIVE PLANTS. I put this in bold because I am becoming a nut over natives. They attract more pollinators, they tend to be happier because they are in their native environment and they lead to the next item.....
- 6. <u>Use less water</u>. Natives require less water. Install a rain barrel (or 2). Use a "smart" irrigation system. Don't fall victim to "mindless" irrigation because that can be far worse for your plants. Mulch properly.
- 7. <u>Feed your birds</u>. You may have read recently that bird population is declining rapidly. Install a bird feeder or two. Feed the birds regularly. And always, provide a source of fresh water. Even in the winter I fill my bird baths and keep a couple of stones in them for the sun to warm the water to keep from freezing.
- 8. <u>Plant trees</u>. If you have some wide-open space, resolve to plant a tree this year. Have a small yard? Plant a small tree in a container. Trees add property value, shelter for wildlife and of course improve the air we breathe.
- 9. <u>Compost!</u> Live greener! Your household wastes add valuable benefits to your garden once they are composted. Don't toss those greens, egg shells, coffee grinds down the disposal...it's not good for your disposal and it is just wasted soil benefits. It's free too!
- 10. ENJOY, RELAX, HAVE FUN in your garden....in the end isn't that what it is all about!

Conservation can be overwhelming--how much can one person do? Where to start? Sue and Abbie recommend these wonderful and effective suggestions from REI.

REI's "THE OPT TO ACT PLAN": 52 simple weekly challenges for a year of action

(Recreational Equipment, Inc., commonly known as REI, is an American retail and outdoor recreation services corporation. It is organized as a consumers' co-operative. REI sells sporting goods, camping gear, travel equipment, and clothing. It also offers services such as outdoor-oriented vacations and courses (wikipedia).)

January

Week 6: Get familiar with your local recycling and composting options and guidelines.

Each local government in the United States sets its own rules for what's recyclable and compostable, so

take a moment to look up the instructions for your neighborhood. Your municipality or county website

should include information about what to recycle and where, plus pickup times. Some communities even

offer composting pickup services and printable instruction manuals, which you can pin up above the bins

in your house. If you're still puzzling over what to do with those especially confusing items (like batteries

or old electrical cords), Earth911 provides an online recycling search tool where you can type in the name

of a waste item and the website will tell you where to put it, depending on your location. The EPA

also has a guide for how to recycle common items.

Week 7: Recycle snack wrappers in a TerraCycle bin at your local REI.

You can now recycle snack wrappers at an REI store near you, thanks to a partnership with Subaru

and TerraCycle. As long as they're clean, individual, multipack and family-size snack bags and wrappers,

including chip, candy and granola wrappers, are all accepted. Collect all your snack wrappers and bring

them with the next time you stop by REI.

Week 8: Celebrate Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s legacy by getting out and serving others.

Every January, the country celebrates activist and civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. with a day

of service in memory of the inspiring leader's dedication to nonviolence and helping others. This year,

MLK Day falls on Monday, Jan. 20. If you can, plan to take the day (or organize a group work outing) to

volunteer at a nonprofit organization in your community.

Take part: Jan. 19-25, 2020


Week 9: Try to go paperless for one day this week.

Try using a washcloth in place of paper towels. Bring a reusable bag with you for all shopping.

(Remember our tips from week two!) Ask for an email receipt rather than a printed one. Instead of a hard


